In this section, the researcher dealt with the response to Dyrosh's attempt to compare the Noble Qur'an and other divine books and the method of transmitting the Qur'an, which he likened to the transmission of pre-Islamic poetry. Then, Deroush touched upon describing the first Arabic writing and collecting the Qur'an and mentioned that there were shortcomings in Arabic calligraphy in the beginning even though that was a natural development of the Arabic script. Then Deroush claims the lack of idealism in the collection of the Qur'an during the reign of Othman bin Affan. He also addressed the addition of al-Hajjaj bin Yusuf al-Thaqafi to letters in the Noble Qur'an, and Derush also attributed the gilding of the Qur'an to other civilizations, and he also deals with the breaks of verses and suras.
